# Cambridge Royals Endurance Team

Cambridge & District Riding Club had yet to try their hand at Endurance, so Jane Fricker & I decided that it could be a fun day out hacking with friends, so we roped another 2 friends, Karen Tyrell and Shirley Swanson into the team, and the 'Cambridge Royals' were born. We decided on the name Cambridge Royals as two of the team's horses are called William and Harry!!

So the Cambridge Royals were born, however as none of us had ever ridden endurance before, we are all new to Endurance and really didn't know what to expect, but we thought it would be a lovely day out if nothing else.

So we booked our first qualifying ride for Sunday 12 June at Wimpole Way.

The horses have to have their shoes checked by the farrier and their heart rates taken by the vet on the day pre-ride, followed by a trot up to ensure they are sound enough to compete. The fastest pace in the Riding Club Endurance is 15km per hour, what we didn't know was how fast 15km per hour was!!



We set off at a decent paced trot, and wondered if we needed to keep this up all the way round. We let the ponies tell us what speed they wanted to go, but they were all happy to keep at a decent pace trot, until we got to some lovely grassy tracks where we had a good canter!!! The route of 34km took us all round the grounds of the gorgeous Wimpole Hall and the tracks around the countryside were excellent. On the route you are allowed to have crew stops, where friends and/or family meet you during the ride to sponge the horses off, give them a drink, and the riders a drink too!!! This is vital as it keeps both horse and rider hydrated throughout the ride and this helps prepare for the final vet inspection.

When we realised that we were not far from home, we let the boys have a few minutes stretch in walk, and William and Harry even managed a pee ☺ It is important with Endurance that you get your horses heart rate right down for the final vet inspection within 30 mins of your finish time.

So we finished in 2hrs 42 mins, only 5 mins over the optimum time of 2hrs 37 mins so we were extremely pleased that we had managed to keep a good pace!!! After the ride, you have to present to the vet within 30 minutes of your finish time, to have your horse's heart rate taken and a final trot up to ensure soundness after the ride. Your score is based on average kms per hour, and horse heart rate at the final vet inspection. The lower the heart rate the better

the score!! We scored 106.5 which put us into 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the Area 7 league, so we were determined to come first, so we entered the next qualifying ride at Kings Forest on 3 July (see photo above taken there).

Kings Forest took us through beautiful forest land for 32 kms, and we managed to better our team score to 133!! This put us top in the Area 7 league table and top in the overall UK league table. We couldn't quite believe how well we had done!! There was one more qualifying ride that was in easy distance in August at Provost Lodge, so we entered for a final stab at improving our score.

Provost Lodge took us 32 kms through some lovely countryside, with quite a lot of road or gravel track work which hindered our progress slightly, and we came home with an impressive score of 122.1 but we hadn't improved our league table score, but we still remained top in both the Area 7 and UK league tables, so we were more than happy. We waited to see if we had qualified for the finals, and Jane received the official email once the league tables had closed inviting us to the finals at Keysoe on 18<sup>th</sup> September. We are now busy keeping the horses fit and healthy ready for the finals.

The Cambridge Royals team would like to thank our Road Crew Mark, Tony, Dave and Sue for being at every checkpoint on every ride, and not forgetting our ponies, Joshua, Jay, Harry & William. William who is just 14hh has now been given honorary thoroughbred status ☺

Endurance is a fun sport, and you do not have to spend lots of money on equipment or a flash horse, any horse and rider that are reasonably fit can complete the distance. We have only completed 3 rides this year and we are very much looking forward to the finals, and next year competing at Endurance. Our ponies are not bred specifically for endurance, Joshua is an ex racehorse who now events, Jay and Harry are general all round riding club horses, and William is a 14hh Connemara pony who competes at Elementary dressage, so it just proves that anyone can give it a go. We all had a fab time so far and are all looking forward to the finals at Keysoe.

In the with points section, Cambridge had a worthy winner in Eleanor Taylor and Gulliver who produced a beautiful flowing test. The Elementary honours went to Keysoe's Alice Dove and Moonbeam. Sadly one of the three pairs did not start, and Keysoe's Jo Driver & Karen Neal had to pull up at the very end of their test when one horse suffered a tread injury. But the absolute stars were Eleanor Taylor and Jo Lawrence, national champions from two years ago, riding to new music. Gulliver and Trevor worked happily so close together that they bumped several times, but without breaking rhythm or concentration. It was delightful to behold. We wish them well at the Aintree Championships in October.

## CDRC Juniors Success at Area 7 Show Jumping

Cambridge & District Riding Club sent three junior teams and an individual rider to the recent Area 7 Show Jumping Qualifier which was hosted by Rockingham Forest Riding Club at Earls Barton in July.

The first class of the day was the Junior Style jumping qualifier.

This class involves jumping a course of seven fences at a height of 85cms and the riders are judged over each fence, and for the style of their canter on the flat. They are then given marks out of 10 for each fence and are also marked out of 10 for their position/effectiveness etc, similar to a dressage test.

Our team consisted of Emma Butler on Ben, Tara McCabe on Itinerary, Rachel Dyke on Sunny Destination and Lauren Howse riding Hacker Jack.

Not only did our team win the class, but Emma won as an individual, Tara was 2<sup>nd</sup> individually and Rachel was 5<sup>th</sup> so all in all, a brilliant result for Cambridge.

Sadly we not able to raise a team for the Junior Novice qualifier, but Emma Butler on Ben rode as an individual entry and jumped 3 fantastic clear rounds to finish in second place. After it was discovered that the winning rider had been disqualified, Emma was subsequently invited to ride at the novice championships in September!

The Junior Open show jumping saw two C&DRC teams competing against one other club for the qualifying ticket. Our Cambridge Queens team which consisted of Rachel Dyke on Lightning 41, Alice Ellison riding Britney IV, Lauren Howse on Hacker Jack and Tara McCabe on Itinerary finished the first round on a score of 4 faults, putting pressure on Cambridge Kings to do better! The Kings team were Will Anthony on Sewstern Briggs, Rachel Dyke on Sunny Destination, Sophie Howse on Cuckolds Tiptoes, and Alice Ellison on Aurora Z. Having had an unlucky couple of poles, they too finished the first round on 4 faults.

The course was raised and the second round commenced. All eight of the Cambridge horses jumped really well, and both of our teams finished the second round on a zero score which meant that we would then have to jump a third round jump off.

The fences were raised once again, and battle commenced between all 8 of our team members to see which team would get the qualifying spot. After a really fantastic jump off effort, it was the Cambridge Queens team who won, with the Cambridge Kings team coming a very close 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Cambridge took all six of the individual places in the Junior Open show jumping as follows:-
